Background

- Involved document analysis and participant interviews from Forest Europe and EU processes

Broader interests

- Increased visibility of forestry
- Greater political attention to forestry
- Forestry on a level playing field
- Legal basis for funding
- Improving coordination and cooperation



Compelling interests

- Production or Protection?
- Subsidiarity and sovereignty
- Rules of the game



Narrower interests

- Differing interests within countries
- Different national priorities
- Self-preservation, protection & self-promotion
- Not meeting obligations in other conventions
- Financial gains
- The choice of experts
- What is the European Parliament up to?



The intersection of interests

- Countries that want to protect their forests for various reasons vs. Those that wish to increase production
- Willing to give up sovereignty vs. Applying subsidiarity
- Different rules for different reasons



What can we learn from this?

- Interests don't always align
- Better coordination within countries
- Longer term perspectives needed
- Further research
 - Forests are not a common good like many other resources
