This volume marks the second issue of *landscape History* to be published by Routledge, a member of the Taylor and Francis Group. Individual members of the Society for Landscape Studies will continue to receive the journal in paper form but it is also available via the T&F website to Institutional members. The current issue is mainly concerned with research methods and covers a wide time-span from the Anglo-Saxon to modern periods. Several papers show the value of fieldwork in indentifying previously little studied features in the landscape and new ways of interpreting old maps and drawings, while a final paper reviews a project carried out in Oxfordshire which endeavours to look at the landscape as a whole on an interdisciplinary basis.
