Martyn Futter is Associate Professor in landscape scale water quality modeling in the Department of Aquatic Sciences and Assessment, Swedish University of Agricultural Sciences, Uppsala. His research focusses on water quality in production landscapes.

Marianne E Krasny is Professor at Cornell University, USA. She works with community-based organizations to examine how self-organized, environmental stewardship practices contribute to civic renewal, ecosystem services, multi-generational learning, and social-ecological systems resilience.

Fred Angulo is Associate Director of Science, Division of Global Health Protection at CDC (Center of Disease control and epidemiology) in Atlanta, USA. Since 2015 he has the scientific responsibility for "International Task Force" against Ebola in several African countries.

Thomas Harttung, CEO of Blackcarbon, has a strong interest for agriculture and forestry with focus on sustainability. Early on, he realized the role of the consumers and he started the company “Årstiderne” to deliver fresh produce directly to consumers.

Tove Enggrob Boon is a creative researcher within forest and environmental policy at the University of Copenhagen, with a large international network. She has successfully developed the research area “Environmental Governance and Behaviour” in collaboration with authorities.

Andreas Brunner is Professor in silviculture at the Norwegian University of Life sciences at Ås and has also worked in Canada and Germany.

Demel Teketay Fanta is Professor in Forest Science at Botswana College of Agriculture in Gaborone, Botswana. He works with agriculture and forestry and is one of the world’s leading experts on coffee.
